### Seven Doon alumni in 15th Lok Sabha

**DEHRA DUN:** The prestigious Doon School here has the distinction of sending seven MPs to the 15th Lok Sabha, including Rahul Gandhi, with four of them getting ministerial berths.

The school is celebrating the entry of seven of its students, also known as Doscos, to the Lower House.

Four MPs - R P N Singh, Jitin Prasad, Jyotiraditya Scindia and Kamal Nath - all alumni of the Doon school, have been included in the Council of Ministers.

Rahul Gandhi is the only Doon School alumni from Congress, who despite being a Lok Sabha member, is not a minister. Significantly, Rahul's father and former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi was also an alumni of the school.

According to school records, besides these five, two other Doscos who are members of the new Lok Sabha are Kailash Singh Deo (BJD) and Dushyant Singh (BJP). - PTI

### Doon squad

Doon School will have a larger representation in the 15th Lok Sabha than ever before. There are at least eight alumni of the exclusive public school which calls itself the Eton of India. The winners include Kalikesh Singh Deo (BJD) from Orissa, RPN Singh (Congress) from UP, Rahul Gandhi (Congress) from Uttar Pradesh, Kamal Nath (Congress) from Madhya Pradesh, Jyotiraditya Scindia (Congress) from MP, Jitin Prasada (Congress) from Uttar Pradesh, Udayan Raje Bhosale (NCP) from Maharashtra and Dushyant Singh (BJP) from Rajasthan.

The clout of the school is even more impressive when you consider that a number of the winners are bound to be made ministers. The Doon losers are: Akbar Ahmed, Mani Shankar Aiyer and Raninder Singh. The unusual number of parliamentarians who hail from just one school was first noticed back in the Eighties. School chums of Rajiv and Sanjay Gandhi, like Kamal Nath, Arun Singh and Akbar Ahmed were encouraged to enter politics along with the Gandhis.

Incidentally, Rahul Gandhi and Udayan Raje Bhosale attended Doon at some point, but did not graduate from the school.

# Ram Guha makes non-fiction pricey

IN A bidding war that had three Indian publishing houses vying for the rights to the next Big India book, historian Ramachandra Guha raked in Rs 97 lakh this week for a seven-book deal that includes a new two-volume biography of Mahatma Gandhi.

Although HarperCollins India and Random House India offered Rs 1 crore-plus as advance for a five-book deal, Guha and his agent Gill Coleridge went with Penguin India for less money, adding two old titles. "It was a very difficult decision," said Guha. "But in the end, we went with Penguin because of their overall strength. We were especially impressed by their presentation of the Amitav Ghosh backlist that Penguin released when his novel Sea of Poppies was published.

Traditionally, big money in India goes to novelists. Ghosh's 'Ibis' trilogy got a reported advance of Rs 55 lakh — roughly Rs 18 lakh per book. Only Nandan Nilekani's Imagining India has got a heftier advance of a reported Rs 25 lakh.

### Guha's Rs 97-lakh deal

"Guha is the biggest name in non-fiction in India," said Ravi Singh, editor-in-chief, Penguin India. "So when he writes a book about the biggest subject in India - Gandhi — it's a different ball game. Earlier writers of non-fiction like Bipan Chandra have sold over 100,000 copies. But it wasn't hyped by publishers or the media." Chiki Sarkar, editor-inchief, Random House India, said, If Ram had written the biography of his other hero, Ambedkar, all the publishers would have fought for it, but the money wouldn't have been as much."

For best-selling historian William Dalrymple, it's "terrific news" for writers in India. "Earlier, firangis like Patrick French, Katherine Frank and myself, and people like Amartya Sen and Suketu Mehta who were writing from abroad were hogging the big-ticket non-fiction

limelight," he said. "Now, publishers are showing great interest in writers from within India."

Guha started working on the Gandhi book before he started writing India After Gandhi, his 2007 best-seller published by Picador India. "India After Gandhi brought Ram out of the academic shelf and put him squarely in the mainstream," said Picador India editor in-chief Shruti Debi.

The seven-book deal includes Makers of Modern India, an anthology of the writings of political leaders who were also men of ideas, and a collection of essays, The Past and Future of Indian Democracy. The backlist will include States of Indian Cricket, Savaging the Civilized and Environmentalism. The first volume of the Gandhi biography is scheduled for 2012 publication, while the second is for 2015.

The wedding will take place on 30 and 31 January at the Centre's premises.

# Man on a mission

70-year-old Sunny Singh has dedicated his life for the betterment of the girl child

With a desire to do something for the giri child, Sunny Singh, a former executive director of General Electric Company, Calcutta, left Delhi to settle in Guniyal Gaon near Dehradun.


"I worked in Calcutta for 34 years, and after my retirement I was living in Delhi with my family but somehow I was not satisfied with my monotonous life. I always wanted to do something for society. As I have been associated with Dehradun, I bought some land in Guniyal Gaon to start a school for girls as I strongly believe that girls are the future mothers and educating them is like educating the whole family," said Sunny Singh.

Being a product of Doon School, Sunny Singh (70), faced great difficulty in persuading the pradhan of Guniyal Goon to rent him the school land as well as allow him to start extra-classes in English and computers, so that girls can accept the challenges of life and sland at par with men. "It took a while for the parents to allow their girls to attend classes in my school and to come for tuitions at my home," said Sunny Singh. Starting with nine girls between the age group of 13 to 21 years, at present there are 53 girls out of which, nine are studying in DAV college.

"Belonging to poor families, they are provided fees, clothes, books, bus fare, quilts and even have insurance policy in case of accident and illness. I have got doctors arranged for them and now girls from almost 10 villages are regularly attending the school," said Sunny Singh.

Besides education, Sunny Singh is also assisting the families in getting the girls married. "As poor farmers in the villages cannot bear the expenses of marriage, I provide all the necessary items to the girls required to start a family. My student Kanti is getting married soon and I have arranged everything for her," said Sunny Singh.

Sunny Singh is also fighting for the cause of female foeticide. "I keep in constant touch wit' the state authorities to fight against female foeticide. I also plan to come up with another school for vocational studies so that girls can get easy employment," he said.





### **OUR NEW HEADMASTER - DR. PETER MCLAUGHLIN**



The Doon School announced the appointment of international academician Dr. Peter McLaughlin as its new Headmaster. Dr. McLaughlin moves in to fill the position of his predecessor, Dr. Kanti Bajpai, who is in Oxford for pursuing his interest in teaching after a successful six year tenure at The Doon School.

Dr. McLaughlin joins The Doon School in July 2009. He is a British national who has

worked in the U.K., South Africa and Egypt and brings with him over twenty-three years of experience in the field of education of which the last ten years have been at the helm of leading ternational schools. His recent assignments have been as the Headmaster of Casterton School which counts amongst the best boarding schools in the U.K. since 2005, and previously as the Principal of the premier British international school in Egypt for six years.

Dr. McLaughlin will be the fourth British Headmaster of The Doon School after the founder Headmaster Arthur E. Foot in 1935, followed by J.A.K. Martyn and finally C.J. Miller, who concluded his term at the School in 1970. Hence the Doon School will have a British Headmaster after a gap of 38 years.

Welcoming Dr. McLaughlin, Mr. Analjit Singh, Chairman, Baord of Governors, The Doon School, said, "In an era of change whilst the Doon School aims to hold its position as a top school in the world, Dr. McLaughlin is a welcome choice as a highly

experienced Head of School with tremendous experience both in the UK and internationally with schools having a similar philosophy and ethos. He brings the right balance of traditional Boarding School experience, having headed an all boys school and an all girls school, coupled with international and contemporary academic practices which should be vital in helping The Doon School shape its students into honourable and responsible citizens."

Dr. McLaughlin, who spent his formative years in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe), completed his doctorate in History and a post-doctoral fellowship at the London School of Economics. He returned to teach in the History Department at the University of Rhodesia. He pursued his interest in history, teaching, researching and writing on revolutionary and guerrilla warfare and lecturing, including at Sandhurst and other British academic establishments, till his yearning for sustained academic interaction between the teacher and the pupils made him return to secondary education in public schools in the UK.

Dr. McLaughlin is married to Elizabeth, who was a teacher and boarding housemistress earlier in her career and now works in schools' marketing and promotion.

The Doon School Old Boys' Society welcome Elizabeth and Peter McLaughlin to the DOSCO family and wish them a long, happy and memorable stay in Chandbagh and a successful tenure at the Doon School. We at the DSOBS are always available to help Elizabeth and Peter in any way we can and look forward to working with them in the years ahead.

Ajay passed away on December 16, 2008 in New Delhi after a battle with cancer. He was already at School when I joined in 1950 and we were in the same class. We were not particularly friendly while at School and actually got to know each other well much later, when both our elder sons Subroto and Abhay (and our daughter Preeti) studied at the Lawrence School in Sanawar under the DOSCO Headmaster, Shomie Das.

While our children were at Sanawar, Ajji and his wife Sarup (Narni) and my wife Ruth and I religiously spent most of the first week every October attending their Founder's Day celebrations. It is then that we became close friends. Shomie and Pheroza, his lovely wife were wonderful hosts during our visits to the Lawrence School. Interestingly, Ajji's younger son, Raghav (133-KB) and our younger son Ravi (594-HA) followed family tradition and went to the Doon School. Ajji's granddaughter Devika and our grandson Imaan (26-H) who is now at School,

were classmates at the Shriram School in Delhi.

Ajji was a fantastic diver. If I remember correctly, his *forte* was from the one meter springboard. He was one of the youngest to get his diving colours. His swimming abilities were not so great, just enough to get out of the pool and prepare for the next dive!

Ajji's first love of course was cricket. As an outswing bowler he was an important member of the School team. On the eve of a house match against Mayo College in 1955 he got injured and the 12th man, Kamaljit Chaudhri (48-J) got his chance to play and took full advantage of the opportunity. Kamaljit was a brilliant fielder but is remembered more for the century he scored in the following year away match against Mayo going in to bat at No. 10.

We will miss Ajji and our hearts go out to Narni and the family. May he rest in peace.

### **ERIC SIMEON**

Reading Dilip Simeon's tribute to his late father, I was reminded of the time when I first met Jean and Eric Simeon, more than half a century ago.

The year was 1954 and my employer, Burmah-Shell, sent me on a tour of duty Mhow, a small cantonment town in the middle of what is now Madhya Pradesh. Mhow was in the middle of what is known as the Malwa Plateau. It was a small town, and like all cantonments, spotlessly clean and organized wonderfully well. The climate was wonderful, brief summers followed by crisp and invigorating winters.

Mhow was actually a training establishment for the Indian Army. There were two 'schools' both commanded by a Colonel and the whole establishment was in charge of an officer of the rank of igadier. The two schools, were the 'Signals' school and the 'Infantry' school.

Directly opposite my quarters lived some young instructors belonging to the Signals school. One of these was V.M. Sundaram (216-K), 'Sandy' to all of us. Just down the road in two houses facing each other, there lived two other Instructors of the 'Signals' schools. Eric and Jean Simeon lived in one of these along with their son, Dilip, who was about 6 years old then. Opposite them, lived Yeshwant (Chandu) Desai, ex-61-T and his wife, Suhas and their two daughters, Jyotsna and Mekhola. Later, another DSOB joined the Signals school as an instructor. That was Vikram Sinha (ex-123-T). His newly wed wife, Meenakshi came along with him.

Having established the Doon School connection, we met often in each other's houses or at the local club. We played badminton and tennis, went on picnics and had a wonderful time in that wonderful place. Sandy and I were keen on cricket. We played as often as we could. We went together to see a young and relatively unknown 'Madras' (not Tamil Nadu then) team defeat the redoubtable Holkar XI with several Test stars in their ranks and with Mushtaq Ali as their captain, in the Ranji Trophy final of 1954. I had just come from a year of league cricket in Madras (now Chennai) and hence knew most of the Madras players personally. I had them over for

dinner at my place and one them, a young spinner by name Sarangipani, who had never scored more than 10 in the local league games, hit a breathtaking 79 in the final. And he was a little worse for wear with beer just the night before!

Eric and Jean were the leaders of our group. Eric was the senior most, both in rank and age, but he could still vanquish men much younger than him, at squash or badminton.

But the high watermark of my stay in Mhow came when our group was selected to put up a 'play' for the entertainment of the local officers. The play was an old 'West End' production by name 'A Worm's eye view' which had been playing in London for several years. Our producer was Pilloo Manekshaw, the wife of then Brigadier, now (late) Field Marshall, Sam Manekshaw. It was a one act comedy with lots of laughs and pranks. I was to play the part of a severe and finicky father and Suhas Desai was my young playful daughter whose behaviour did not meet with the father's approval. Jean was the maid in the household and had to ape a broad cockney accent which she did commendably well. In the scene before the last one, I, the grump father, is beaten up by one of young Suhas's suitors. So in the last scene, I had to appear with a black eye!! This was contrived by putting a smear of black boot polish round my eye!! We played for three nights before packed houses. It was wonderful fun.

After that time at Mhow, I kept in touch with Eric and Jean, first at the Doon School where my elder son, Ashish, had joined and later at the Cathedral School in 'Mumbai', as Bombay is now called. Suhas and Chandu were also in Mumbai, but have since then moved to Delhi. Sandy Sundaram came to Mumbai because his daughter also worked as a journalist here died suddenly of some illness. And now poor Sandy has also passed away. But my memories of those happy times will remain and so also the memories of those wonderful friends.





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### 1st DSOBS INTER-HOUSE HOCKEY



The DSOBS organized the first old boys inter-house hockey tournament with a total of 71 participants this March. This event followed up on the success of the weekly game of field hockey that the Delhi old boys have been playing since May of 2008.

Taking a cue from the Inter House Cricket format each house had to field 2 'boys' who had celebrated their Silver Jubilee at Founders. The tournament was played on a knock-out basis. Oberoi house players (Rajesh Verma and Akshay Modi) were accommodated in the Kashmir House team. Kashmir House had the 'seniormost' seniors in their rank spearheaded by Sheel Sharma, Moin Qureshi and Harshul Sondhi. Each team was allowed to field 18 players along with rolling substitutions so that fresh legs were always available - as during their playing days on the main field! In order to keep the games safe, players were not allowed to hit the ball inside their opponent's 25 yard line and no deliberate raising of the ball was permitted. As insurance, Shivinder Singh provided first aid assistance on the field. It was certainly used.

The first DSOBS inter-house hockey tournament was inaugurated by Mr. Vikram Lal, (member of the Board of Governors) and Kishore Lahiri (Vice President, DSOBS). Kashmir and Jaipur were drawn to play the first game.

### Kashmir V Jaipur

The game got off to a cautious start as players familiarized themselves with their teammates, opponents style of play and also the field conditions. Vimalendu Verma's thigh was the unfortunate recipient of a raised ball from Rajesh Verma early in the game and the knock forced Vimalendu off the pitch and put immediate pressure on the remaining Jaipur house seniors, Deepak Kaul and Vivek Seth, to play the entire game. But these 'seniors' looked like 'juniors' in comparison to the Kashmir house veterans.

Jaipur gradually started to dictate the play on the field. Jaipur's midfield comprising of Karan Sawhney, Aman Nath, Vivek Seth and Kunal Sharma displayed good control on the ball and regularly fed their skilled and speedy forward line comprising of Anandbir Brar, Nalin Sayal, Sahil Vohra, Nakul Sood, Vikarana Chaudhry, and Uday Bawa. 15 minutes into the game Sahil played a ball in from the right sideline that penetrated deep inside the Kashmir D and Vikarana was present to turn the ball into the goal!

The pattern of play remained much the same after the goal. Kashmir's defense was well manned by Sheel Sharma, skipper Sanjeev Singh, Gaurav (Manas) Aggarwal, Rajesh Verma, and Hanut Barthwal. Given Kunal's & Deepak Kaul's control of the game they had done well to restrict Jaipur to just a solitary goal. Sheel Sharma exhibited great finesse in time and again relieving the Jaipur forwards from possession of the ball and Manas hit some cracking shots to clear the back line. However, the absence of a strong mid-field did Kashmir in. Although the sibling duo of Varun and Rahul Sharma along with Gaurav Talwar, Saurabh Shrivastav, Vivan Somdutt and Angad Dugal played flat out they were unable to regularly feed Kashmir's skillful forward line comprising of Moin, Harshul, Akshay Modi and Prashant Bajaj. Moin's stick work proved that he could manouv the run of play successfully but J house defense thwarted the finish.

In the second half, the task for Kashmir became tougher when Akshay, arguably their best forward, turned his ankle and had to sit out the rest of the game. Jaipur continued to attack Kashmir's goal and Rohit (Tally) Talwar pulled off some great saves. The most memorable being a deflection from Uday that was headed into the bottom right corner until Tally parried the ball away at the last moment. Jaipur made full use of its bench strength and made regular substitutions to bring Himmat Rana and Pranav Swarup to play in the mid-field. Jaipur's backline of Deepak Kaul, Shekhar Swarup and Shehbaz Batra were easily able to thwart the attacks that the Kashmir forwards mounted and Abhinav Gupta's goal was not put under any serious pressure.

Around halfway through the second half, while Jaipur was on attack, Kunal received the ball at the top of the D from the right sideline and played a first time ball in towards the goal. Vikarana was once again present at the goal mouth to push the ball in and score Jaipur's and his second goal. Jaipur headed to the final as winners by two goals to nil over Kashmir.

### Tata V Hyderabad

Both teams listed 4 seniors on their rosters which give them plenty of flexibility in substituting them in and out of the game. Tata fielded Pepe Dugal, Gurmeet Singh, Aijaz Ilmi and Subroto Khan as their seniors with Jaspreet Singh on the sidelines providing moral support. Hyderabad shrewdly fielded the youngest team and sprinkled the seniors with fitness and experience with Arun Khanna, Sunil 'Melly' Gupta, Nalin Khanna and Viraj Chopra in their line up. This game was expected to be a hard-fought affair and it lived up to its billing! Play was mostly restricted between the twenty five yard lines of the two teams. Both teams had strong mid-field players who were adept passers and also quick in closing down opposing players with the ball. The H house mid-field was ably manned by Arun Khanna, Ishaan Kala, Hanumant Khanna, Amitoj Singh and Shailendra Singh. The defense was led by team captain Jatinderpal Bhathal along with Shobhit Verma, Udayan Singh, Nikhil Sharma and Shivendra Singh with Abhishek Singhi in Goal. The offensive line included a mix of senior players Nalin, Melee and Viraj and youngsters Pranav Sahai, Varun Chaddha, Arjun Sood, and Vivaan Rai.

Tata house was well represented by the Sardar clan in their younger ranks. Jaiinder Singh Chopra, Premjit Singh Chopra, Prithvi Singh Gill, Shamsher Singh, Sukhinder Singh Chopra and Umaid Singh Gill made up most of their mid-field and attacking players. I wonder which School can boast of bringing its fraternity from the age of 19 to 88 together on the hockey field.

Each team added a player to their eighteen for this game. Shivinder Singh and Ishaan Tiwari joined the Jaipur and Hyderabad defenses respectively. The final began for Jaipur in much the same way as their semi-final with Vimalendu picking up a knock in the first few minutes of the game. Despite his misfortune Vimalendu has vowed to return to the tournament next year and his enthusiasm for hockey and playing for Jaipur House remains undiminished.

Hyderabad had the better of the early exchanges and made a few attacks on the Jaipur goal. Both keepers did well to stop the strokes. On Hyderabad's fourth stoke Jatinderpal Bhathal scored and the 2-0 score turned Jaipur's next stroke into a sudden death situation. Sahil Vohra's push clanged off Singhi's right post and Hyderabad were winners of the first DSOBS inter-house hockey tournament. It was Hyderabad's temperament led by their Goalkeeper Abhishek Singhi which proved victorious in the end. Jaipur were undeservedly the losers. Ajay Swarup then popped open the champagne left by Kishore Lahiri & poor Singhi got soaked in it. The Dosco spirit got truly manifested.

The tournament on the whole was a great success and the efforts of Akshay Thapan, Jatinderpal Bhathal, and Sanjeev Singh in organizing their teams needs special mention. As also the enthusiasm shown by all the seniors who played what most would regard as a young-person's game. 



# IMPORTANCE OF A NEW ART CURRICULUM IN THE DOON SCHOOL



# Mr. ALOKE TIRTHA BHOWMICK Head Of The Art Department

In the academic education system art has always been there since the Greco-Roman period. But the question is what did they use to teach? The drawing, the measurement, the understanding of forms and shapes or just the technical craftsmanship! Perhaps it is a combination of all these things and along with that an aesthetic sense was ingrained among the students of the 'academy'.

After the industrial revolution in Europe art education got a different course. It is the course led by the commercial need of the society. Landscapes and portrait painting became a tradition and possession of the wealthy patrons to show their status and grandiose life style. During that time the working class had hardly any place in the painting or sculpture. The First and the Second World War stirred that existing situation in such a way that the concept of beauty and the concept of possessing something beautiful proved to be transient. Art became a language of communication rather than only depicting the beauty. Art objects are no longer an object of possession but it made its way from the drawing room of the bourgeoisie to the crowded street of the proletariat. So, as the confinement of art got removed the technique of producing art has also increased. Printmaking came into existence after the advent of the press, though we find etchings and dry-point prints by Rembrandt and Dürer done earlier.

Apart from the main stream courses, textile designing and ceramic works was also in vogue with the rising need of the industry and the newly developed working middle class in the society. To talk about textile designing we are indebted to the tradition of tapestry done in the Byzantine era as well as the Chinese art of weaving the silk. There the religious cause or rather 'religious advertisement' formed the basis of developing such a medium besides fulfilling the decorative purpose. The development of ceramic artifacts dates back to the 1st Century AD in China. Cultures especially noted for fine ceramics include the Chinese, Cretan, Greek, Persian, Mayan, Japanese, Dominican, and Korean cultures, as well as the modern Western cultures.

With the rise of new middle class, textile industry and the ceramic and glass industry developed more and with the advancement in transport, the cultures of the continents becoming closer to each other, there was an admixture of influx that set creativity ablaze like

the phoenix coming out of the hell of the middle age.

The Pop era, though short in time graph, is limitless in influence. The rise of America gave a throttle to the art world in both its aesthetics and technique. Silkscreen printing, assemblage, environmental sculpture, documentation achieved the aura of art. Consumerism and advertisement go hand in hand. After Pop movement, posters, billboards, prints, packages and brochures all got wrapped up into the famous word called 'design' that catches anybody's sight even when moving along a zebra-crossing or speeding by a highway.

The digital world, the post pop, the post modern, the minimal etc. came into existence into the complexity of human expression after 1960s. Art is no more a technical aspect but a 'knowledge production'. Art became plural; multiplicity now defines it. Technology and aesthetics go hand in hand. So, at this situation a student of art should get acquainted with the varieties of techniques that will prove to be fruitful to express his or her creative faculty. Art became a statement, a fashion of living, a standard of proving oneself to be a post modern cultural human being.

With this view, The Doon School has proposed to set the curriculum in such a way that a student passing out with art as one of his subjects can explore the vast arena of multiplicity of creative activities.

Painting and sculpture helps a student to build up the basic sense of visual composition in both two dimensional and three dimensional space; and this conception further helps that student to execute his her ideas in other contemporary mediums. As printmaking is the first form of mechanical reproduction, a student can experiment with the ideas by changing the forms and colours of the basic creation and can reproduce it authentically. Moreover, certain unique effects of printmaking and the journey of experience through this medium is an additional gain to the students.

The second half of the twentieth century had also seen the immense technological development and the modernization of the urban life. Fashion became a statement not only in the upper class but also in the middle class. Textile industry started growing in the more fashionable way. A student acquiring the aesthetic sense and the various techniques of textile designing from an institution like The Doon School is thus a boon to the society and the vast market is a good option for the students to explore and to form a brand on his or her own in near future with further technical guides.

The art of ceramic and glass designing has always been finesse in the tradition of decorative arts. Ceramic tiles have been an element of mosaic murals since the Byzantine era. Apart from that the art of crockery and vessel designing has seen the epoch holding the hands of these materials.

Last but not the least; the 21st century world has become a digital world. Digital reproductions, digital prints are now defining our visual vocabulary. The post modern world of installation art, video art and digital documentation is the predominating trend that will bring all the other art forms into a cohesive whole in the most minimal way.

From the canvas painting to the digital celebration of art, it's a long journey that encompasses all the ups and downs of aesthetic jargons and technical jugglery and in my school the training in all these mediums should enable a student to open the door of creativity where the world is opening up with new scopes to explore. The future art education is hinting us to the liberation of our creative soul through a more universal language, with the multiplicity of the regional flavour and taking technology as the means and not the ends.
