He was very emotional and cared deeply for his family which got easily extended to his in-laws,



Our Society has been quite active during the past two years and I am sure that with the increased participation of its members the level of activity will accelerate.



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CHANDBAGH - THE ORIGINS

Sometime around 1946 our class was taken by our geography master, Mr. Gibson, to visit a tea garden some distance outside Dehra Dun. It was owned and managed by possibly one of the last English planters in the Doon Valley, and had been started by his grandfather in the previous century.

While I do not recall any other details, I do remember clearly that he mentioned that the Chandbagh estate was originally one of the earliest tea gardens in Dehra Dun and was known as "Cha Bagh". When the estate was taken over by the Forest Research Institute it was renamed as

Chandbagh. The Doon School, as everyone is aware, acquired this estate when the FRI moved to its present campus on Chakrata Road.

Incidentally, I would like to comment on Kaulagarh Road, which goes from Chakrata Road near Skinners field. The ONGC offices which lie on this road were until the 1950's the site of the Sirmur Tea Estates, with a factory to process the tea. My planter friends from Assam will remember that in Assam a tea factory is known as a "Kolgarh". Maybe this is how Kaulagarh road got its name.

THE DOSCO ENVIRONMENT

he Sixth World Wilderness Congress got together wildlife and environmental activists in Bangalore not only from the host Country but from USA, Europe, South Africa, New Zealand and some from Southeast Asia. Equally significant was the dinner hosted by Sayajirao Gaekwar for the Dosco invitees to the Congress. As we sat sipping excellent whisky in the terrace garden of his Walton Road apartment we could not but admire the range of plants that surrounded us. It turned out that Sayaji's wife Nikku is responsible for making them blossom and has of late not been able to devote sufficient time to them because of her involvement with saving Cubbon Park, among the few open spaces left in Bangalore. The Karnataka government has denotified 32 acres of the park in order to build a MLA hostel on it.

Thus not only Doscos but their wives are taking up causes to protect the environment, as they well might considering that life in the cities has become a veritable nightmare. Hari Dang with his usual passion announced the builders' lobby which was determined to encroach upon the remaining lungs of all urban centres. It was reminiscent of the old days, of the old Hari who got us involved with the publication of "The Cheetal", the maintenance of the deer park and of course mountaineering.

There were at least three Jaonlities present at Sayaji's get-together. Excluding Hari, who recently invited all those on the two Jaonli expeditions to his Gurgaon residence to celebrate its Diamond Jubilee, there was the host, yours truly and Darius Taraporvala. Darius, currently with NDTV, recalled the exploits of A.N. Dar who was on both the Jaonli expeditions and is now the Headmaster of the Scindia School, Gwalior. He remarked that though we had all gone gray, we had all kept our figures because of our early mountaineering training. Of course this may well be also because Sayaji takes his golf seriously, Darius runs around on his

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3. The minutes of the 58th Annual General Meeting had been circulated to all concerned. Mr. Shomie Das [ex 165-H] and Mr. S. K. Kandhari [ex 122-T] proposed and seconded that the minutes be approved. The same were duly confirmed and approved unanimously.

4. ANNUAL REPORT BY THE PRESIDENT

The President's Report is reproduced below:—

The last year has been an extremely active year for our Society with activity on many fronts. I think I can best summarise this by discussing the activities of various committees that our Society has, each of which is headed by a committee member.

A. The Bursary sub committee headed by Lt. Gen. Gurbir Mansingh has been overseeing financial aid consisting of:

- (a) One full scholarship for a student studying in the Doon School this has been increased from Rs. 55,900.00 to Rs. 66,000.00
- (b) Financial aid to the children of the late Dilip Lal, an Old Boy, from donations made by the class of 1968 - Rs. 22,000.
- (c) Financial Aid for Varnita Pant, daughter of the late Mr. & Mrs Pant Rs. 51,000.
- (d) Financial aid for six students studying in the Salangaon School run by the John Martyn Memorial trust - Rs. 24,000.
- (e) Financial aid of Rs. 25,000 from income generated from collections of classes of 44,45, & 46 of Rs. 25,000 to two sons of Old boys in need of financial help. The Society will continue to award two bursaries annually each of the value of Rs. 10,000 per year from this fund.

I would request each class having its Silver or Golden Jubilee to make a small contribution towards the corpus of this fund which will be used solely for bursaries for Old Boys' sons in dire financial need.

B. The Memorabilia sub committee headed by the Vice President, Deepak Nirula, has greatly enlarged the range of good quality memorabilia although the scheme of sending these by mail order has not been successful. Memorabilia is now also kept in the School Store for direct sale and discussions are on

the make some additional items for us including golfing accessories.

C. The Society's Old Boys Placement Cell headed by Lalit Nirula has continued to help many Old Boys to relocate.

D. The Eduction and Training facilities sub committee headed by Nikhel Kochhar has organised a series of talks in School by inviting Old Boys to speak to the boys on various subjects of interest.

E. The ROSE BOWL Sub Committee headed by Samir Kuckreja with Pushpinder Singh Chopra continuing to provide editorial input, has once again brought out three issues of the ROSE BOWL in the last year. As mentioned earlier, of a total of 4000 Old Boys we have been getting subscriptions from only 1500. During the last year we concluded arrangements with both Citibank and Standard Chartered Bank, our partners for two DOSCO Dining cards, to advertise in and underwrite the publication of the ROSE BOWL. They are giving us Rs. 1.25 lakhs annually and the Executive Committee has now decided to distribute the ROSE BOWL free of charge to all Old Boys both in India and overseas and we hope this will be the link for all of us to keep in touch with Old Boys activities.

F. I spoke last year of the very exciting Archives Project which is being undertaken by the Class of 1975 and which will be a state of the art digital computerised system which will preserve our old records, documents, school and house pictures and audio visuals. This is a three year project and a professional agency is being used for advice on the design and establishment of these archives and the project will be completed by the year 2000 which will be the Silver jubilee year for the Class of 1975.

G. An effort was made to strengthen fellowship and camaraderie in our Society at the grassroots level through the formation of DOSCO Dining Clubs. I am happy to report that a large number of DOSCO Dining clubs have been formed all over the country. They meet regularly and some send us their exploits for publication in the ROSE BOWL. I hope a day will come when all of you will belong to a DOSCO Dining Club of your own and I am sure this will help build a stronger and more cohesive Society.

H. Last year I spoke of the discussions that we had initiated with two Credit card companies for introducing DOSCO Alumini Credit Cards. I am happy to tell you that this has had great success. The Standard Charteresd Doon School Visa Affinity Card Agreement was signed with Standard Chartered Bank late last year and a picture card bearing the photo of the main building was introduced earlier this year. The DOSCO Diners Club Affinity Card Agreement was signed with Citibank in June 1998 and this Card is also now freely available to all DOSCOs. As on date, 491 Standard Chartered Bank and 187 Citibank Diners Cards, a total of almost 600, have been issued. For each such card, the credit card companies pay the Society a lumpsum at the time of issue or renewal of the card and also contribute a percentage of the spend each time you use the card.

I had suggested that all Old Boys try and voluntarily contribute Rs. 250.00 per month for a period of two years initially, through these credit cards. Many have responded to this appeal and funds have started flowing in and our Society now has a cash surplus. If out of 4000 Old Boys we are able to get 50% or 2000 Old Boys to join the scheme, our Society will have annual income of Rs. 60.0 lacs. This will make us financially very strong and it will then be a matter of a few years only before we are in a position to find a home for our Society. Towards this end, the Executive Committee has set a target of one crore of which Rs. 45 lacs is for an office in Delhi and additional Rs. 35 lacs is for a fund, the interest on which will be sufficient to meet the working capital needs of our future Secretariat. Rs 20 lacs will be given by us to The Doon School in line with our current policy of giving them 20% of all our earnings and our present net surplus of Rs. 36 lacs wil stay as a safety cushion. We have also obtained Government approval for receiving donations from abroad and for accumulation of funds for acquiring our own Secretariat which means that we no longer need to disburse the majority of our income to retain our 80-G status.

As you all know our Society is one of few that operates without any monthly membership fees and I would earnestly request all Old Boys to lend a helping hand to their Society by joining this Rs. 250 per month contributory scheme. Almost all of us can afford it. Our Society will be what we make of it. Let's all come forward and make an effort together to give our Society a home and some financial strength.

I. This year we have brought out a new, updated DSOBS Register under a committee headed by Ajai Singh and assisted by Deepak Nirula. The new Register has the latest address, phone numbers and e-mail addresses. We have decided to mail it free to all Old Boys who wrote in and gave their latest particulars. Others can obtain the register free of cost from the Old Boys' Society or their Regional Representatives. We have found that the DOSCO Record 96 and The Doon School Book did not sell much last year and so we have reduced their price while making valuations for this year.

J. Our Society has continued to have active get togethers all over India and abroad. Last November Old Boys in Chennai got together after a long break. In May, Vijay Katre of Welcomgroup held another very successful Welcomalunmini gathering at Mughal Sheraton in Agra where we relived our School days and had football

K. In this age of the Internet we have decided that The Doon School Old Boys Society must have its own and arrangements are currently on for registration of the Domain name "Dosco Org". This web site will have a logo, a photograph and feedback form and www.Dosco.org. will be our address which will link up with all the other Doscoo websites.

L. The Sports sub committee chaired by Chitranjan Bakhshi organised the first Old Boy Inter House multi-city Golf Tournament from March to June this year. Matches were played in Delhi, Hyderabad, Mumbai, Chandigarh, Chennai, Lucknow, London and New York. Hyderabad House were runners up and the tournament was won by - who else but Jaipur House! The tournament was a great success and the sports sub committee hope to make this not only an annual feature but also introduce other similar sporting tournaments in future.

M. We still need Regional Representatives for Africa, South America, Sri Lanka and the Andamans and the Classes of 43, 45, 48, 49, 94, 95, 96, 97 and 98 still remain unrepresented. If you have any suggestions or know of anyone who could fill these slots please let us know. During the last year, we had the following new Class Representatives:—

Gen T B Nanda Class of 41; Shaukat Sikand Class of 80; Gautam Vohra Class of 63, Anil Bawa Class of 76; K. S. Madan Class of 50 and Lt. Gen. Gurbir Mansingh Class of 46. The following became Regional Representatives:—

A. K. Atal for Kerala; Sanjoy Roy for dimachal Pradesh; Shivbhadra Sinhji for Gujarat; Amrendra Nath Singh - second Regional Rep for Bihar and Soumitra Sen as the second Regional Rep for Bengal.

N. Special mention must be made of the Committee headed by Samir Modi who organised a film preview in Delhi last year at which the film "Metro" was screened for Old Boys and which helped us to raise funds both for the Society and for the School.

O. I would also like to mention that the Class of 1967 donated Rs. 4.29 lakhs in August 1998, the interest on which (approximately Rs. 40,000 per year) is to be used for one school boy expedition every year.

The Class of 1970 donated Rs. 3.5 lakhs to the school for a DG Set in February 1998 and this has already been installed.

P. In order to honour Mr. Sheel Vohra who retired as the Hony Secretary of the DSOBS after many years of distinguished

service, the Society is organising an Old Boys versus The Rest of the World Cricket Match at the Roshanara Club, Delhi on 1st December 98. Proceeds from this match will be used to make a contribution to the Society and to send Mr. Vohra on a round-the-world goodwill trip to meet Old Boys overseas. Our master organiser Nitan Kapoor who organised the super old boys dinner on Friday evening, is working on this - don't miss this cricket match in Delhi.

Q. I have just heard from Syed Mustafa Anwer Hussain, Project director of The Chandbagh School in Pakistan that The Chandbagh School in Pakistan had a soft opening on 21st September this year. The formal inauguration and Founders Day will be in February 99 and we hope to take a group of Old Boys to Pakistan for this happy event. All those keen on going should contract the Executive Secretary, Lalit Mathur.

During the last two years, our Society has taken great strides in many directions and gone from strength to strength. The credit for this goes to our very talented Executive Committee. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for all the superb work put in by all of them on so many different projects during the year. I would like to particularly thank Manjit Singh and Arjun Malhotra who retire from the Committee this year.

Gentlemen, it has been a privilege to have had the opportunity of working with all of you. Thank you.

5. APPROVAL OF ACCOUNTS

The Accounts for the period ending 31st March, 1998 had been circulated to all members. Mr. I.S. Mann [ex- 65 T] and Mr. R.C. Bhargava [ex- 154 T] proposed and seconded respectively that the Accounts be adopted. The same were approved unanimously.

The House unanimously resolved that they should all be reelected for another year proposed by Kr. Prem Malhotra [ex- 155 H] and seconded by Mr. Jyoti Shirodkar [ex 288-H].

As there was a vacancy in the 30 - 40 years age group, the President asked for nominations. Mr. Anoop Bishnoi [ex- 122 JA] was proposed by Mr. Darshan Singh [ex- 90 T] and seconded by Kr. Prem Malhotra [ex 155-H] and unanimously accepted by the House.

8. POINTS TAKEN UP WITH THE PERMISSION OF THE CHAIR

A. Mr. Rajeev Lal proposed that in addition to the existing Regional Representatives in various countries, a coordinating International Representative should also be nominated. He felt that such a person with the help of Internet would be able to coordinate DSOBS activities of International Reps. all over the world. He himself volunteered to be the first such Representative and this was unanimously accepted.

B. The Executive Secretary informed the house of the sad demise of Mr. Sunder Mehta father of Mr. Sudarshan Mehta [ex- 124 J Class of 1942] on 29 July 1998. Mr. Mehta had donated the existing Cricket Pavilion in 1946 to the School.

C. The Executive Secretary appealed to all old Boys to come forth with bursaries for the Salangaon School (John Martyn Trust).

D. The Executive Secretary appealed to Old Boys for sponsorship of printing more copies of the DSOBS Register 1998 as only 2000 copies had been possible with the available funds.

The Executive Secretary proposed a vote of thanks to the outgoing Executive Committee member who had served the Society so well.

Mr. Lalit Nirula proposed a vote of thanks to the outgoing President and on behalf of all members expressed appreciation of his invaluable contributions to the Society.

The meeting was then adjourned.

Sheel Vohra Farewell Cricket Match

At an Executive Committee Meeting of the DSOBS in May 1998, I made a suggestion to the members that we should consider arranging a suitable farewell to Mr. Vohra on his retirement - this was unanimously accepted and suggestion applauded. The ball was in my court now!! After considerable thought I selected 6 committee members and formed The Sheel Vohra Farewell Committee. The biggest task ahead of me was to get Mr. Vohra's approval for what we were about to organise. The first few trips to Dehra Dun were without much luck, but on the fourth such trip I found that I was making sense to Mr. Vohra. Initially he resisted any "grand" event, and wanted a low key affair to which my answer was "Sir, let us atleast aim for the sky, and see where we reach". Having got his approval I then had to freeze a date, book a suitable ground and above all set the motion in selecting the 2 teams - The Doon School XI and the Rest Of the World XI. Many have asked why "Rest of the World", and my patent answer has been "For us Doscos, anything outside the boundaries of Chandbagh is in fact "rest of the world".

At an Old Boys get-together this January at Delhi Gymkhana Club I spotted Mike Dalvi and to my delight I had found "The captain"!! I observed Mike for almost an hour, and then after his nth. beer I approached him and got a promise that he would infact captain The Doon School XI. A major task was achieved and I felt that there was progress made. The next step was to find a selection criterion for the other players - after all we had over 4000 Old Boys, so how does one select around 15/20 team and reserves from such a big number. The obvious choice for guidance was Mr. Vohra, so I trotted of once again to D. Dun and over a dinner meeting I asked Mr. Vohra to suggest the names of "His Blue Eyed Boys "Within 15 minutes I had in front of me a list with names, numbers, houses, year of joining, year of leaving and location (for some even the exact postal addresses and telephone numbers were provided) - there were a total of 57 names!! What a memory-sometimes I have difficulty in remembering my own year of joining, and here was a man who knew it all. The project made even more sense to me, and it motivated me in a manner that this farewell match was to be an "obsession" for the next 6 months.

With 57 names in hand, we wrote to all requesting their acceptance, while we went ahead and looked for the grounds and fixed a date. There was some discussion at our meetings as to whether we should fix the match for a weekend or on the day after the term ended. Eventually we decided that it was only fair to give an opportunity to the maximum school kids to attend, and as such the date of December 1st. 1998 was fixed and the venue as Roshanara Club, which had an association over years with Mr. Vohra and school.

Many names were suggested for the Rest of the World Team, but it was not until I met Sunil Dev one day that I realised that making lists was easy but getting ex-test cricketers was one big job. After having given me this news Sunil went on to say that he could request Kapil Dev to lead the other team. Weeks of writing, phone calls etc. resulted in Kapil Dev agreeing and I was a happy man on November 10th, 1998 when I went to meet him and he gave me a letter confirming his participation. Simultaneously we had been contracting other Test cricketers and eventually we had a list of 15 famous cricketers who had all agreed to play.

The onerous task of selecting the final list from the 57 names was perhaps more demanding. Mike Dalvi and Aditya Bhide took on this duty and through a process of balancing the team, giving consideration to the people who were travelling long distances from U.K., U.S.A. and the Middle East, were able to short list 25 players, who eventually formed the team and reserves. On the other side we were able to finalise the names of 15 players and reserves for the Rest Of the World X1.

With both venue and teams finalised, we had to start discussions on the financial side and this lead to a decision that a commemorative brochure be brought out to mark this event. To lead this specialised team were committee members Mohit Jayal and Robin Roy. Brochure appeals were sent out to over 5000 addresses which included Old Boys, parents, sponsors and people who in the past have supported DSOBS events. To this end we must thank both Standard Chartered Bank and Citi Bank in making available the facility of sending our brochure appeals—Anoop Bishnoi did a fabulous job in assuring that appeals were mailed to almost everyone we could think of!

A special mention must be made to Mr. Mason who in conjunction with Mr. Burrett, our committee representative at school, assured that all parents received a prochure appeal, and more importantly made it possible for almost 150 present school boys to attend the match.

I woke up at 5:00 am. on Tuesday morning; it was December 1st. 1998, and the match was to take place in some hours. Haripal Singh Gill probably woke up a bit earlier, as it was his job to reach Taj Mansingh Hotel that morning and cross his fingers that all 25 Doscos would arrive at the appointed time of 7:30 a.m. to catch the coach for Roshanara Club. Nervous as hell and on my way to Roshanara Club I phoned our captain Mike Dalvi at 7:30 a.m. hoping to hear from him that the entire team had arrived. What I heard on the other side was a sleepy voice "Yaar what time is it?" I must have died a

thousand deaths! My polite reply to Mike was "What the hell is wrong with you". I then had a few seconds of silence and to my delight I heard Mike laughing and saying "Take it easy, Chairman Sahib, we're ready to board the coach." What a relief!

At the appointed time of 9:00 a.m. we had our entire team at the club. Our chief guest Mr. Sheel Vohra arrived punctually and most players of the Rest Of The World were also there, but only 2 persons were not to be seen—Kapil Dev and Sunil Dev. This did cause acceleration of heartbeats, but by 9.45 a.m. the Devs also arrived! We were now all set for the much awaited Sheel Vohra Farewell Cricket Match.

The toss was won by Mike Dalvi who opted to field. The sun began to show betwen the few clouds and the weather gods sent their signal that we could expect a fine sunny day, and look forward to some high quality cricket. The openers Sunil Dev and

Satish Babbar did well to last almost 10 overs, with Sunil Dev being caught by Chandrachud (Rocky) for 4 runs. R.P. Devgan was in next and scored a stylish 26 runs. After 16 overs Surinder Khanna retired with 59 runs to his credit. In came Kapil Dev and one could feel that many were nervous on the field, especially the bowlers! Kapil showed his magic and was difficult to stop—he scored a brilliant 67 runs, and was caught by Arun Khanna, who incidentally is still nursing his finger which was injured whilst taking this most difficult catch.

Bond was the main umpire, and as usual, made the correct decisions. For those who were there to bid him farewell after 43 years of dedicated,



May we assure you and your families how much the school cherishes your return to your former home. Some of you have shown appreciation of the maintenance and upkeep of the campus and we are glad you noticed. In the last five years there has been a systematic upgradation of facilities of the school, involving water supply and sewerage, renovation of the School Hospital and Jaipur, Hyderabad and Kashmir Houses as well as establishment of two new buildings housing the best equipment in science and technology. Our work continues improvement of external electrification and plans to enlarge and modernise the school kitchen. The emphasis in these major changes has been in the interest of the health and safety of the boys of the school.

There were a few staff changes in the year. Winston Gomez resigned his post of Head of English in May '98 to accept appointment as Principal of Vidyashilp Academy in Bangalore. Mr. R.S. He will be remembered for his commitment and dependability.

We welcomed to the school Mr. Sanjay Makhija as Catering Manager, Mr. Jacob D. Vakkayil as Librarian, Mr. A.K. Chalasani to teach Environmental Science, Mr. Kamal Ahuja to teach Accounts, Mr. Salim Akhtar Yusufji to teach English and History, Mrs. S. Ray as Dame of Oberoi House, Mrs. N. Manjeshwer as Dame of Hyderabad House, and Ms. H. Lally as Dame of Martyn House.

We were glad to get affirmation of our boys' writing skills in the Albert Barrow All India Inter School Creative Writing Competition conducted by the council in

November '97. We received both awards for the competition, Faiz Tajuddin placing first and Arjun Chowdhary second. At the awards ceremony in Calcutta in December the school also featured as a finalist in the Frank Anthony Inter School Debate and ran the risk of securing awards there as well, but for a tactful rearward action of our debaters, who came third.

On the busy front of activities we had a lean season in cricket but excelled in hockey and football, winning the local Council School's tournament in both. Basketball had wide exposure peaking with a visit to Colombo, Sri Lanka, recently to participate in an inter-School Tournament. Swimming caused a splash with an unprecedented 10 records broken in the Inter House Meet. In Table Tennis Rajat Jain won the District Table Tennis Championship (under 14 and in the subjuniors category) in November '97 and the Mini State Table Tennis Championship in June '98. In Squash Mihir Raj Kapoor won the North Zone Inter-School Squash Championship in the under 19 category.

The International Award for Young People, exactingly co-ordinated by Mr. Derek Mountford has inspired thirty two Bronze, twenty eight Silver and twelve Gold awards in the last year.

This year's English summer production, while setting a new record in brevity, (the audience was advised not to blink) laudably developed an episode in a class text, Dicken's, 'Great Expectations', into an entertaining musical drama, under the direction of Mr. Ashad Qezilbash.

Hindi drama continued to explore contemporary Indian themes under the tutelage of Hammad Farooqui in its summer production in May '98. Staged in a natural setting, outside the Music School, the play 'Chanda' featuring Doon School boys as well as Welham Girls entertained through music, rustic humour and charming sentiment, while raising disturbing questions that probed the Indian psyche.

The Group's latest production, staged in the school on Thursday 8th October, 'Motey Ram ka Satyagraha' continues the school's mission of provoking ideas through drama.

Our English production staged yesterday was in the same vein. Mrs. Phyllis Bose, well respected in Calcutta for her contribution to English theatre graciously accepted our invitation to work with the boys on the Founder's Play, 'The



Fireraisers'. In the two months Mrs. Bose has worked on this production, the boys have learnt much of the art and discipline of theatre.

The Headmaster and staff of Scindia School, Gwalior paid a goodwill visit to the school in April and played our staff in a cricket match and presented an entertainment for the school. Accustomed as we are to the joys of exchange programs and visitors from far and near this gracious gesture from a fellow community touched us deeply.

In April we sent boys on exchange to Mollified School and Wellington College in Britain, Appleby School and Trinity College School in Canada, Louisenlund in Germany, Ivanhoe Grammar School in Australia, Wanganui Collegiate School in New Zealand and the English School in Cyprus and received students from Australia, the USA, Canada and Britain. Mr. Vijay Pokhriyal of our Mathematics Department left with his family for Britain in August on a one year exchange programme with St. Edward's College Oxford. In his place we are pleased to welcome Mr. Richard Anderson and Mrs. Anderson. Richard has lost no time in taking up his duties of teacher and tutor and is sharing his experience of the IAYP programme.

For fifteen years our Dr. Biala has shown a generation of students the great thrill of outdoor adventure by taking them on cycling, rafting and mountaineering expeditions. This June he led a nine member team South of Everest to Island Peak, of whom Dr. Shukla, Aparajita Biala, Chandrashekhar Nagar, Rituraj Sinha and Attul Pandey reached the summit of 20,300 feet. He speaks now of hanging up his crampons and passing on the flag to his able lieutenant, Dr. Shukla. Even if he does so we know the pause in his commitment to this sport will be a comma not a full stop.

We thank him for his care.

For many years we have been active members of the Round Square movement around the world involving schools in adventure and service activities. Our staff and student representatives participated in Conferences held in Dehra Dun, Assam and recently in San Francisco and worked on a community service project in Shivpuri near Gwalior in Madhya Pradesh. Dr. Madhav Saraswat, our Round Square representative, had the distinction of being appointed leader of an international project, in Ladakh in July this year.

In other fields of service our boys interact with the children of the Ashwasan Centre on campus, visit a school in Kheri

village regularly and made a substantial voluntary contribution from their pocket money for a major relief project in the Rudraprayag district in August. Staff members and boys traveled to villages in that region and distributed clothes, medicines, blankets and utensils to people who had lost their homes in landslides.

At the start of the new year at a time when the SC Leavers were looking beyond the Board examination to a new life, tragedy struck leaving the school numb and a family inconsolable.

It is with deep regret I record the demise of Farid Nedou (243-HA) a student of the SC Form, of injuries resulting from a car accident, on 12th February, 1998.

In the last board examinations held in March '98 all the school's candidates of the I.C.S.E. and I.S.C. examinations were successful. In the I.C.S.E. (Class 10) Abhishek Singhania secured the best result with 94.4% while in the I.S.C. (Class 12) Rohan Kumar Thakur topped with 93.75%.

We have some of the finest young minds in the country and they find natural growth and expression here in a system which rewards initiative and originality while demanding substance and consistency. It is possible that the non-formal aspects of our training carry further in the building of genuine interests but we cannot afford to slight the formal processes of learning, as in the world of work competence is defined as knowledge tempered by initiative.

It is customary to flog the old cart horse Indian education and moan about examinations and heavy syllabuses. Fortunately, with the Council, schools have representation in matters of curriculum and examination reform, and in recent years have witnessed a sea change in the system, providing greater flexibility and autonomy. But it remains for individual schools to devise appropriate strategies in curriculum transaction to meet current pressures, particularly weighty syllabuses. This is a direction that this school, ever alert to new ideas, must explore. The world new insights into communication and organised leering are producing beneficial results. As far as we are concerned, the anxious question is: can we preserve our present diverse culture and yet excel academically? The answer is an unwavering Yes! Provided we rationalise the availability of time for these pursuits, while optimising teaching effectiveness.

The school continues to explore new modes of communication in learning. Following the establishment of our Information Technology Centre last year the

Department has made rapid strides in the provision of computer aided learning systems as well as internet facilities for students and staff. I would like to record my appreciation of the resourceful help of. Mr. Jayant Hari Har Lal who has recently taken over as Co-ordinator of the services of the IT Centre. There is much ground to be covered in exploiting the potential of technology in learning and we are committed to the project. Moving in that directing half the staff recently undertook a training programme in computer applications and the other half will do so later.

Not that the human factor has undergone a depreciation in the school milieu, as the activities of the Teachers' Centre will bear out. in the last year the Centre, which has 32 member schools, has held over twenty educational workshops and seminars, including a three week Contact programme on the teaching of English by the Central Institute of English and Foreign Languages. The Centre also conducts outstation programs and educational audits.

In an experiential learning exercise in January this year, Faiz Tajuddin, Rajit Singh Shinh, Rohit Agarwal and Anirban Mukherjee visited the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore. They stayed in the institute for the period of a month, working in the department of Physics. They were able to synthesize a superconductor and test its physical properties, using advanced analytical equipment. The report which they submitted on the return, also included discussions on several research laboratories that the team visited while in Bangalore.

No record of the school's achievements would be complete without an acknowledgment of the work of our domestic staff in looking after this campus. The administration and faculty work hard, adjusting to new modes and new technology. Your respect for their work is their greatest encouragement.

And the boys? We have reason to be positive about the future of this school community. This confidence does not come merely from the huge advantages we enjoy or a presumption of a privileged future. It comes from the promise that the boys now who. Let us hold them to that promise then, parents and teachers, through a nurture of vigilance and care, setting an example ourselves and expecting only the best. We will then have done our duty.

Funds for the Doon School Old Boys Society

here will they come from and how will they be spent

At the last Annual General meting of the Society the President spelt out in considerable detail the measures being taken by the Society to raise funds. He also outlined how it was intended to utilise this funds since only a limited number of mebers of the Society were able to attend the AGM. This note in the Rose Bowl is intended to inform all members of the Society of the policy being followed to raise funds and our plans for the spending of these funds.

Where will the money come from

The Society is unique in the respect that it has no annual membership fee. It has perforce to resort to other means to raise the funds to fulfill its objectives. The following have been identified as the sources where funds can be raised for the Society:

The Credit Card Scheme in partnership with Standard Chartered Bank and Citibank whereby the banks will issue DOSCO dedicated credit cards and in turn give the Society a lump sum as well as a small percentage of the spend on each card.

Invitation to DOSCOs who have these cards to subscribe Rs. 250 per month through these cards for a period of two years.

- Sponsored special events such as the film premiere.

- By contributions from individual classes

who may make a specific collection for a stated purpose. Examples are the School Expedition Project sponsored by the class of 67 and the Archives Project undertaken by the class of 75. The funds from such contributions go to the

- With the splendid initiative of the Classes of '44, '45 and '46, collections made by classes at the time of celebrating their Golden or Silver Jubilees are donated to the corpus of the Society's Bursary Fund the income from which is utilized towards bursaries of sons of DOSCOs studying at the Doon School.

The Executive Committee will always welcome any additional suggestions from its members on additional ways of raising funds.

Where will the money be spent

Plans for spending the money collected include the following;

- Build up a corpus of Rs one crore. Of this utilize approximately Rs. 45 lakhs towards acquiring a permanent office for the Society, use the income from about Rs. 35 lakhs towards the establishment costs of running the Society and give about 20% of the amount to the School in keeping with current policy of donating a proportion of funds raised to the school.

- The present net surplus of Rs. 35 lakhs to remain as a cushion.

Utilize the collections made for a dedicated purpose for funding those activities at school such as the archives project or the school expedition.

- Towards financial aid to students. The financial aid is being approved by a committee consisting of the President or Vice President of the Society, the Chairman of the Bursary Committee and one more co-opted member of the Society's Executive Committee. The financial aid concurrently under distribution includes a full scholarship for one student at the Doon School, aid to the children of the late Dilip and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pant, financial aid for six students at the Salangaon School run by the John Martyn Memorial Trust as well as financial aid in the form of bursaries to the extent of Rs. 25,000 per year to the sons of DOSCOs studying at the Doon School.

- We can do a whole lot more particularly by extending bursaries to the sons of DOSCOs studying at the school. The Executive Committee makes a special appeal to the Class Representatives of all classes celebrating their Golden or Silver Jubilees to make a dedicated collection for the Bursary Fund of the Society. In keeping with the splendid example of the classes of '44, '45 and '46 the Society would welcome this practise being made a voluntary rule as part of all Jubilee celebrations.
