VIJIT RAMCHANDANI

(ex 275 - JA '76) July 31, 1960 - February 22, 2001

Vijit was born in Calcutta on July 31, 1960 and he passed away in his Minneapolis home in the USA, early on Thursday, February 22, 2001, of a heart attack.

Vijit grew up in Bombay and later went to the Doon School in Dehra Dun.

He joined college in the USA in 1978 and got his first job in Minneapolis, where he lived and worked for 17 years.

Vijit and Beth Gilbertsen were married in January 1991 and they had ten perfect years together - a true meeting of hearts and minds.

They enjoyed collaborating on various projects where they used their experience to teach others how to work together more effectively. They were independent consultants in the field of Human Resources Development.



Vijit earlier worked with the Amherst H. Wilder Foundation, where he assisted organizations with leadership collaboration and cross cultural

communication. He worked closely with Southeast Asian and other immigrant communities in the twin cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul and became well known and respected in his field for improving multi-cultural awareness. One of his greatest joys was to listen to and share music with others via his home collection: Curryland Studios.

Vijit was an accomplished tennis player and an amateur poet. Much of his poetry dealt with his immigration experience.

Vijit was loved for his compassionate nature - a person who valued harmony and who consciously worked to make the world a better place.

DSOBS - GUJARAT EARTHQUAKE RELIEF FUND

January 26,2001 saw the worst earthquake in independent India, which claimed over 20,000 lives and rendered over 2,50,000 homeless. 

A lot of hard work went into organizing this exhibition, and considering the time in




(3rd & 4th from Left) Vikram Srivastava & Amjad Ali Khan

Dear Friends.

As you all know, I gave 40 years of my life to the Doon School (1952-92) and have served it with devotion, loyalty, hard work and sincerity and rose from a clerical post to the responsible job of Scholars admission officer.

Unfortunately, the School had not formulated any Pension Scheme till the time I retired (in 1987). So I have nothing to fall back upon. To add to my woes my wife became seriously ill in 1993 and is permanently bed ridden with Paralysis

and damaged Kidneys. Having been deserted, we had to take shelter in Prem Dham, a Home for the Aged in Dehra Dun, throught the kind courtesy and timely help of Mr. G. Ramchandani to eke out the rest of our life. But it costs Rs. 3200 pm for our Boarding and Food and Rs. 1000 pm on the treatment of my wife's prolonged illness and I just don't have the funds. This is a desperate situation which I am facing and am trying my best to arrange funds provisionally to meet the above demands. Mr. Ramchandani had kindly issued an

appeal in 1993 to Old Boys who knew me. The response was generous but those funds have now dried up and I am left with absolutely no choice but to make a fresh appeal. I have no idea how may more years my wife and I have but I need a bare minimum of Rs. 4500 per month to subsist. Please come to my aid.

"FOR HILLS TO CLIMB" AND SIACHEN PEACE

The Doon School's contribution to the early years of Indian Mountaineering was celebrated with éclat on 22nd and 23rd June 2001 at the India International Centre (IIC). The Himalayan Club (HC) and the Indian Mountaineering Foundation (IMF) joined the Doon School Old Boys' Society (DSOBS) in organizing this.

The occasion was the Fiftieth Anniversary of the first major Himalayan climb by an Indian expedition. It was on 23rd June 1951 that Gurdial Singh, Roy Greenwood and Dawa Thondup climbed Trisul (23,360 ft.) The two other members of the expedition were Nalni Jayal and Surendr Lall. Three of the expeditions' four members were from the Doon School.

The Anniversary was commemorated by an Exhibition, the release of the book "For Hills to Climb", a presentation by the Trisul team, and a dinner. Besides many other mountaineers of all varieties, the events were attended by the President and the Secretary of the DSOBS, Ajay Shriram and Rajbir Singh, by many old boys and the Headmaster, John Mason.

The Exhibition was mounted at the headquarters of the IMF from June 13 to 19; it was then shifted to the IIC on June 22nd and is to be on view at the Doon School from mid September to the end of November. It will then revert permanently to the IMF.

It was conceived and organized by Indira Ramesh and consists of a series of most attractive panels on synthetic fabric, combining photographs excellently reproduced, embellished with well-chosen texts. The whole conveys the Spirit of the Hills and stresses the ethics of mountaineering. For instance, one of the texts is an extract from a Speech by Gen. Smuts on Table Mountain: "The Mountain is not merely something externally sublime. It has great historical and spiritual meaning for us.

... It is the ladder of soul, and in a curious way, the source of religion........ We may truly say that the highest religion is the Religion of the Mountain." The photographs are of the Trisul expedition 1951 (how much younger they were then!) and these were supplemented by a series of water colours by Roy Greenwood, obviously a man of many parts.

The exhibition was inaugurated on 22nd June by Aamir Ali and was followed by light refreshments.

The main event, held in the auditorium of the IIC on 23rd June, was organized jointly by the HC, IMF and the DSOBS. It was presided over by Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan, President of the IIC, a member of the Indian Public Schools Society and a lover



mountains. She released the book "For Hills to Climb" and the three surviving members of the Trisul expedition spoke of their experiences and their approach to the mountains.

The book was published by the DSOBS which raised the funds for it; it is an outstanding publication, well illustrated, and the Society can well be proud of it. It is a collection of articles, many of them from the DS Weekly, of mountaineering trips and expeditions by Doon School boys and old boys. The initiative and the main effort for this book came from Nalni Jayal and Gurdial Singh.

The tapestry of various contributions are strong together by some superb editing by Aamir Ali, adding enormously to its readability. In the words of a reviewer, "it is so well done, the writing just flows and the text entices you to read on".

Gurdial spoke of how his love of the mountains had been inspired by the writings of great mountaineers and become a life-long passion. This had brought him in touch with many remarkable personalities and had continually enriched his life. Roy Greenwood was proud to have been a member of the Trisul expedition and outlined what the mountains meant to him.


Obviously they had inspired him greatly and his talk - as also the paintings he had contributed to the Exhibition - reflected the poetry they had evoked. Nalni spoke with his usual energy deploring the commercialization of mountaineering and the erosion of its ethical values. He thanked the DSOBS and the many people who had contributed to the successful publication and the Exhibition.

The President, Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan, made and impassioned plea for the protection of the Himalaya, a vital part of India's spiritual heritage.

The Siachen Peace Park

In speaking of the message of the book "For Hills to Climb", its editor Aamir Ali pointed out that if Doon School old boys took pride in having been pioneers of Indian mountaineering, it followed inevitably that they must accept their share of responsibility for protecting the Himalaya from pollution and degradation. There was one situation which must hit them in the eye and which they could not ignore: the Siachen Glacier.

This glacier was the scene of a military stand-off between the armed forces of India and Pakistan. Several thousand soldiers were stationed there: the Indian base camp was at 12,000 ft. Nearly all the many casualties were due to altitude, cold and weather conditions. Everything had to be helicoptered or air-dropped: military supplies, artillery, shells, arms, ammunition, food, drink, fuel, clothing, tents and medical supplies. Nothing was flown out. The tons of garbage generated by several thousand men living there could neither be burnt nor destroyed so it was thrown down the nearest cerevasse. Human waste alone amounted to some 1000 kg a day; this was packed in metal

drums and also thrown down crevasses. When this garbage and waste finally comes out after several generations at the snout of the glacier, our descendants will wonder at the legacy we had left them: tons of garbage and loads of shit.

This situation had continued for over 17 years. There was one solution which might end this stand-off without compromising the basic- and irreconcilable- positions of the two countries: establish a Transfrontier Peace Park. There are 136 transfrontier parks in the world on the borders of 98 countries. Some of these were specifically peace parks, set up in zones of conflict. A Siachen Peace Park would free a spectacular mountain area from further degradation, would save hundreds of lives, would save crores of rupees, and would facilitate further agreements between the two countries.

In view of the imminent Summit between the Indian Prime Minister and the President of Pakistan, the Meeting unanimously adopted an Appeal to the Prime Minister of India suggesting this solution, and asking him to consider it with statesmanship and vision.

Alas, the Summit Meeting ended in disagreement and disarray. But the idea of a Siachen Peace Park not only remains alid but becomes more important than ever.

"THE SPIRIT OF THE HILLS"

An Exhibition commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of the first Indian ascent of Trisul (23,360 ft.)

This Exhibition was a presentation of the Himalaya Trust at the India International Centre on 22 June 2001, with financial support given by the Indian Mountaineering Foundation. It was conceptualised and coordinated by this writer and designed and visualised by Rajeev Manikoth of 'The Visual Idea', a Bangalore-based designer.

Anniversaries, especially those that span half a century, are deserving of commemoration. But one such event nearly got away without even a mention. Had it not been for a letter bearing a Spanish postmark that was delivered at Dehra Dun late in 1999, the event would have, in the self-effacing manner of its protagonists, quietly faded into oblivion. The letter, addressed to Nalni Jayal reminded him of a day in 1951, when four young men decided to try and climb a mountain named Trisul, a spectacular three-peaked summit rising to 23,360 ft. in the Garhwal Himalaya.

Two of them had actually got to the top. The writer of the letter, Roy Greenwood, one of the summiters, wanted to know if it was possible for the old team to celebrate the event by walking up to Gwaldam from where Trisul's three peaks may be seen in awesome splendour! While this was clearly not possible any longer for the three

seventy-years-old, it was evident that not only did we have an event on our hands, but a history, a story worth telling.

The ascent of Trisul in 1951, in fact, marks the beginning of Indian mountaineering. Harish Kapadia notes that at a time when it was predicted by the editor of the Himalayan Journal of 1947 that Indians would never take to mountaineering as a sport, a modest Indian team confounded the sceptics by climbing a major Himalayan peak in so laid back a manner as would have delighted the heart of the alpine purist. With few technological aids, or even appropriate climbing gear, this small party of novices led by Gurdial Singh went up without any fanfare, accompanied by three Sherpas.

The more one researched the background of the Trisul climb, the more it was apparent that one could not separate the history of mountaineering in Indian from the history of the Doon School. It was no coincidence that three of the four members of the Trisul team were from the Doon School, neither the early masters or the boys could avoid lifting their eyes to the hills with the spectacular Himalayan range at their doorstep. Nalni Jayal and Surendr Lall, both old boys of the Doon School, and Gurdial Singh, a master, owed much to the inspiration and encouragement of their mentors and guides, the early masters of the Doon School, who motivated their young charges to climb for fun as much as to learn to be with Nature. The seeds of the Trisul expedition and Indian mountaineering were sown a long way

To recreate the period and the event of 1951 visually for an exhibition, all that we had to go on was a sequence of tiny 2" X 2" black and white contact prints, taken during the expedition with a Rolleicord camera by Nalni Jayal. Three articles written by the climbers for the newspapers of the time provided the narrative - "the only way we could make up some of the money we spent from our small salaries for our

adventure!"

The fifty-year-old monochromatic prints, uneven and patchy as they were, were scanned for a uniform density. Blown up for the six large display panels of 7' X 3', and placed against a luminous backdrop of the mountain interspersed with the narrative, they began to come to life hinting at several stories that lay behind the scenes - not merely the climb itself ("the wretched business of putting one foot before the other" as Gurdial wrote), but of the spirit that moved these young men and others of that era, the innocent, idealistic times they lived in, the inspiration they derived from books and companions, and their real life heroes, their teachers.

As the panels unfolded the story it was obvious this was vintage mountaineering: the extraordinary, joyful response to the beauty of the mountain landscape, the enchantment of the flower-filled meadows, the first encounters with willow warblers and barrhals, the grandeur and challenge of the awesome terrain that they were going through.

It was also an age of floppy shorts and PT shoes, army jackets and tinned baked beans - and of course the ubiquitous diary, faithfully updated each evening. Truly an Age of Innocence, a charmed time of life when climbing for profit and fame were as yet unknown. That time was to come all to soon when Everest was "conquered" in 1953, and today, for a consideration of \$65,000, can be "assaulted" again.

Trisul was not merely the first high mountain climbed by an Indian team, it was symbolic of an ideal, of a dream, when men came not as conquerors, but as pilgrims, when no flags were hoisted on the summit, when, in the words of Gurdial, "whatever the fate of Trisul might be, we kindred spirits all could at least be sure of the lasting satisfaction of the congenial company share and enjoyed in a mountain venture."


